helping them to tell their story
at the heart, everyone participates
the minutiae of people's lives
how we bring those systems together
they finished the experience and they were all best friends.

Push ourselves to go to the utmost frontiers the most extreme form of participation:

being more open to fail
it's almost like there is no end
it's circular
people want to join the journey
or leave the journey
at different points
no one's going to stop you doing a good feedback loop
we are fluid as a community.

I'm going to answer your question now:
we are in some ways all performers
everyone is sitting in a circle
welcome them
encapsulate this enthusiasm:
the whole is greater than the sum of its parts
synchronise and blink with each other
you've got to move at the speed of trust
the magical world of storytelling
and case studies that have been peer reviewed
a whole spectrum of creative and participatory methods
far-reaching, co-owned research
process is as important as the impact
understanding the balance between talking and listening.

What will we do with it now that we've built it? What is the end?
We learn from reflecting on our experience the final question of the afternoon:
