


The Multifunctional Rural Transition


- Agriculture Intensification
 - → increased productivity BUT...
- Increasing demand for environmental protection
 - → agri-environmental schemes
 - → purchase of land for conservation
- Increased demand for amenity use of rural land
 - → growing middle class
 - → increased mobility and access to countryside





- Environmental Land Management scheme (ELMs)
 - → "Public Money for Public Goods"
 - → phasing out of Basic Payment Scheme

The Impacts of Brexit




- Departure from EU's Common Agricultural Policy (CAP)
 - → What will happen to marginal farms kept afloat by CAP's direct payments?


- Environmental Land Management scheme (ELM)
 - → Will not offer the same support as the CAP
 - → Increased presence of lifestyle/non-farming landholders

Ranking the biggest purchasers over the past 10 years by category




Who should deliver public goods?



- Broadening the spectrum of public goods providers
- Policies need to account for changing rural demographic, or else:
 - → missed opportunity to further promote public goods
 - → unable to balance DEFRA's two goal of productivity and public goods
- Challenges for effective policy engagement
 - → policies that align with practices and motivation
 - → Shifting the idea of "good farming" to be more conservation centred

How should landholders be incentivized?

- Past schemes utilised a behavioural approach
 - → Examined willingness to change



How should landholders be incentivized?

- Past schemes utilised a behavioural approach
 - → Examined willingness to change
- Limited success in long term behavioural change
 - → Incomplete information
 - → Ignores complex interactions between internal and external factors
 - → Value-action gap

Less appropriate given the growing diversification of landholder motivations?






