

Abdul Mageed Education Trust – Health Information Session on Cervical Cancer Screening and Risks

On 8 July 2024, we were invited to undertake a health awareness session hosted by the Abdul Mageed Education Trust in collaboration with the BME Health Forum at the Church St Library in Westminster, on cervical cancer screening and risks, as part of a Cancer Awareness Communications and Engagement Project.

Background and development of the session

We were introduced to the Abdul Mageed Education Trust by one of the Imperial Patient Experience Research Centre (PERC) Community Partner steering group members. PERC identified Dr Apostolia Galani, Clinical Research Fellow researcher at Imperial College as a speaker.

Slides used in the session were reviewed by PERC ahead of the session to ensure they were in lay language and accessible.

Format for the session:

- Accessing cervical cancer screening: what you need to know: automatic invite sent to 25 to 64 year olds
- Customising your screening experience
- Next steps after screening
- Advancing knowledge through research

Questions asked during the session:

- Is there a specific size of speculum used during smear test?
- Is HPV transmitted only sexually or are there other ways?
- Does HPV infection mean that you have cancer?
